

Walking Worthy of Our Glorious Calling

(() beg you ... bear with one another in love." When this theme emerged for the World Day of Prayer 2024, drawn from Paul's letter to the Ephesians, none of us could have known how powerfully it would speak to the devastating situations of this year. Through our Palestinian sisters' witness, these words took on new depths of meaning as global conflicts intensified. As I reflected on this theme, watching conflicts unfold not only in Palestine but across our world, I found myself asking: Do we have real followers of Christ? Are we living by the teachings of Christ? What would Christ have done if He were here on earth with us?

I struggle to find easy answers to these questions, as I'm sure many of you do. Yet the passage from Ephesians 4:1–3 helps guide us on this journey we jointly embark on. We are called to walk worthy of our glorious calling—not through grand gestures, but through the daily practice of patience, gentleness, and humility, making every effort to maintain the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace.

Let me share a story that illuminates this truth. In a community close to the river, a rich woman consistently showed

kindness to her poor neighbor, despite her husband's objections. He would prevent her from sharing food, declaring their neighbors unworthy to eat what their children ate. His wife would plead, "We may be rich, but they are our neighbors. For Christ's sake, let us help them—in times of trouble, they are the closest to us."

When a storm broke the riverbank during the rich woman's absence, the community initially refused to help her family because of her husband's past cruelty. But the poor neighbor rang a bell through the village, calling all Christians to "save a person in distress." Through his appeal, the community came together to rescue the husband and their children—bearing with one another in love, even in the face of past unkindness.

Sisters, it is important that we live in unity. Unity is visible. Unity is not accidental. Unity requires us to merge our lives with each other, centered in God's word. Otherwise, we are individual links who have proximity to one another but are not the united chain we are to be in Christ. As we journey through very difficult situations in all parts of the world—economic, political, social, and psychological struggles—we must remember to continue praying and striving to do what is right, even in the face of adversity.

Let us be more patient with each other. Let us be gentler with each other. Let us be humble, not thinking so much of our abilities or knowledge. Let us bear with one another because of the love we have through Christ.

May we continue to pray with and for our sisters in Palestine and have faith that one day there will be everlasting peace.


EPHESIANS 4:1-7*

I Beg You . . . Bear With One Another in Love

We are deeply grateful for the unity and strength we found in coming together as women from diverse ecumenical churches across Palestine. Writing the 2024 program allowed us to share our stories, struggles, and faith in the face of ongoing challenges. Despite the unexpected war that broke out on October 7, 2023, we are thankful for the prayers and support of the global Christian community, which have given us hope and solidarity.

The Holy Spirit was our constant guide, especially during moments when we felt overwhelmed by the situation in Palestine. We felt the Spirit leading us to focus on love and resilience, reminding us of our faith in times of despair. This journey helped us find peace amidst uncertainty.

Writing the 2024 WDP program was exciting because it gave us a platform to voice our faith, culture, and experiences as Palestinian Christians. The opportunity to share our unique perspective with the world and the collaborative nature of the process were both energizing.

Initially, our understanding of the theme, I Beg You ... Bear With One Another in



Love, resonated as a call for patience and mutual understanding. However, over time, it deepened into a powerful reminder of the importance of solidarity and love in the midst of conflict and division, both within our communities and with the global Christian family.

A highlight in developing the materials was getting to collaborate with women from different churches across Palestine. We shared stories of resilience and

created prayers that reflect our collective faith. Seeing how our local stories eventually resonated globally was truly inspiring.

We encourage future writer countries to embrace their unique experiences and trust that their stories will resonate globally. Focus on collaboration, and allow the Holy Spirit to guide the process, especially when challenges arise.



BEING THE FOCUS OF GLOBAL PRAYER

Being the focus of global prayer in 2024 was both humbling and empowering. In the midst of political tension and war, knowing that people around the world were praying with and for us gave us strength, reminding us of the power of global Christian unity.

Many WDP committees and organizations from around the world reached out to us with messages of solidarity, prayers, and support. These interactions were heartwarming and helped us feel connected to our larger global community of faith. Of course, it was sad to learn about things that were done by parts of our global movement without consulting us or the WDP

International Committee, particularly regarding our stories and lived realities.

The most significant challenge we faced was addressing global misconceptions about Christians in Palestine, especially post-October 7. We had to navigate sensitive topics while maintaining a message of unity and hope.

The political situation also added pressure and emotional weight to the process. Although tensions escalated leading up to the 2024 worship service, the challenges we face have long been a part of our daily lives. For this reason, we were disheartened when some parts of the movement pressed for extensive discussions about altering our program due to recent events. Our liturgy (written long before October 7, 2023) shows and

enlightens the ongoing and everyday struggles we consistently face and pray for.

Prayer brings us together, even when we see things differently. The only thing we felt moved to add was an additional prayer written in February 2024. This prayer called for strength, resilience and hope for those affected by the current war, while also asking for God's guidance to end conflicts and cultivate peace, particularly in the Holy Land. This is what we can do these days . . . be resilient in our prayers.

We received many comments of gratitude from people who were moved by our reflections on love and perseverance in the face of adversity. One particularly touching comment was from

a woman in South America who said our stories helped her see the humanity behind the conflict.

Many understood the presence of Christianity in this part of the world in a different way than it is portrayed. People have thanked us for the beautiful way of putting the liturgy, an olive tree carrying us through and telling the story of the Palestinians living in occupation.

PRAYERS ECHOING ACROSS PALESTINE

The 2024 celebration in Palestine involved prayer services, ecumenical gatherings, and workshops focused on peacebuilding and reconciliation. We used the Bible Study and PowerPoint

presentations in workshops and services, focusing on the theme of love and reconciliation. These materials helped to deepen understanding and reflection. We also had Palestinian food, and local plants. Many young women have been involved through workshops and social media outreach. These young women are interested in learning more and are constantly creative with ways of expression.

A major challenge we faced was the difficulty of gathering people from different regions in a time of heightened security concerns and travel restrictions. The political tensions also made it challenging to create a truly ecumenical celebration, but we persevered in finding ways to connect virtually and through

smaller gatherings. There were a lot of women pastors attending and reading in some services. Some churches did not attend the services, but we hope that will change in the future.

There were three services held, one in Jerusalem, one in Bethlehem and one in Ramallah. This made it possible for everyone to join, since the difficulty of getting permits prevents Palestinians from coming together in one place. We worshiped in Arabic, English and German. Around 1,000 people attended services throughout the country, with many more participating through online broadcasts.

Offerings were collected during services, with a portion going towards supporting





local Christian initiatives and another portion being sent to WDP's Annual Contribution. Many of the offerings went to support local women organizations, such as St. Marthas, and Christian Families in Gaza.

THE JOURNEY CONTINUES

The future of WDP in Palestine looks bright, with a strong focus on ecumenical unity, peacebuilding, and continuing to share our unique voice with the global Christian community.

One lasting impact from this experience is a renewed commitment to peacebuilding and ecumenical dialogue in Palestine. The interest in coming together to pray with each other has become stronger. We are also planning to establish regular interfaith prayer meetings.

We are hopeful that the 2024 celebration will lead to a greater global awareness of the Christian presence in Palestine.
We also hope this program inspires stronger ties across the global Christian community.

We are grateful for all the support from the WDP International Committee, who have lifted our voices. Their steadfast support made sure that our experiences in Palestine and Israel reached a global audience.

We ask the global movement to continue standing with us in unwavering prayer, both for and alongside us. Our hope is that this solidarity extends beyond words into prayerful action

and engagement. We eagerly await continued opportunities to share our lived experiences with the world, and we extend a heartfelt invitation to all: Come, walk on our sacred soil, witness our resilience, and let your presence be a testament to our shared faith and humanity. Together, let us bridge all that divides, and nurture a future illuminated by love, peace and understanding.



Middle East



EGYPT

Despite the challenges of war and threat, we prayed fervently for peace, embracing a deep sense of compassion for those suffering. The theme urged us to support one another with patience and love amid trying times. With Bible studies and moving hymns guiding us, we were grateful to the WDP Palestine

Committee for their inspired theme and service.

Inspired by the theme and the story of a pastor and his wife at All Saints Cathedral, who adopted a child with special needs born to difficult circumstances, we felt called to act. We decided to support the Village of Hope, a center dedicated to helping young people with disabilities. Their compassion mirrored the spirit of the day, as did the remarkable work of a woman leading efforts to transform the lives of disabled youth.

LEBANON

On March 1st and throughout the week, we celebrated the 2024 World Day of Prayer in various churches, in multiple languages, with services for both adults and children. The chapels were beautifully adorned with Palestinian-themed



decorations, and participants wore traditional Palestinian attire. We began with a presentation about Palestine's history and current situation, followed by prayers, Bible readings, and reflections on the theme, "I beg you, bear with one another in love." This resonated deeply with us as Lebanese, given our shared Middle Eastern heritage and challenges. It was energizing to explore how we can support Palestinian human rights while navigating our historical tensions. The theme inspired us to practice love and solidarity despite hardships.

TURKEY

We decided to celebrate the worship service this year in the Syriac Orthodox Church because a lot of the members of their parish speak Arabic and Aramaic. Their choir supported the singing of hymns in the service. The choir also made a video with the help of the Bible Society of Turkey, which was included in the WDPIC Global Virtual Choir. The war in Palestine is very present in the political affairs of Turkey. Here, the fronts are very clear. It was not easy to inform people about all sides of the conflict. We were excited that the women of Palestine are



trying to find solutions to work and live together. In Turkey, where there are a lot of different religions and nationalities, it is a permanent challenge learning how to live together in peace, and learning

what steps are necessary to bear with one another in love. We are grateful that WDP Palestine reminded us we always have to put in effort and work to achieve peace in this world.

Africa





BOTSWANA

We resonate strongly with this year's theme: Botswana has high rates of gender-based violence, particularly against women, and intimate partner homicides. This violence that women face makes it challenging to embrace this year's theme, which tells us to love one another, and we empathize with the violence Palestinians are currently enduring. However, we thank the women of Palestine for reminding women everywhere that we must strive to bear with one another in love despite our circumstances.


CAMEROON

In some cities, this year's celebrations opened with peaceful demonstrations by women singing and carrying signs of protest that read, "No to injustice!," "No to

oppression!," "Yes to Peace and Justice!", "Let us support each other in Love." We reenacted scenes from the stories of the three Palestinian women - Eleonor, Lina and Sara – bringing to life the themes of oppression, exile, solidarity, compassion, and love. These themes resonated with us, as there are over one million internally displaced persons in Cameroon. We wondered: "How can one rebuild a new life far from one's roots, one's land or one's home that one had to flee because of the war and its corollary of suffering? How does one survive in a risky environment when one chooses to stay there and put into practice Jesus' command to love our neighbor as ourselves?" The stories of Lina, her Aunt Shireen, Eleonor and Sara helped us answer these questions, particularly Aunt Shireen, who was able to offer loving resistance to the oppressor and support everyone with

love. This was edifying and had a profound impact on our community.

During the Children's Program, we taught them about the olive tree, and the children understood that they too are like the branches of an olive tree, rooted in the love of God. During the Bible study, women meditated on challenges we face as a country: violence against women, gender-based violence (GBV), inflation, identity crises and more. This year, we are committed to supporting internally displaced persons and women experiencing violence, to provide them with both material and physical, moral, psychological and spiritual charity. The Palestinian women are a model of strength, courage, resilience, faith and love in the face of injustice, frustration and oppression.



DEMOCRATIC REPUBLIC OF THE CONGO

This year, we faced many challenges of our own, including armed conflict, political instability, currency inflation and falling commodity prices, and 7 million internally displaced people, most of whom are receiving minimal assistance. Palestine is not only important in our time but it is also a country that has existed since the Old Testament, and it shares a common ancestor with Israel, Abraham. This theme is the answer to division and instability: we are called on to support each other in love, whatever our beliefs and allegiances.

GABON

We felt challenged by the theme of bearing with one another in love in the face of oppression. Gabon felt particularly touched by this theme because we are coming out of a post-electoral crisis which ended in a military coup, and the theme allowed us to understand that supporting each other in love could lead us to a newfound social peace. The theme brought to our celebrations the awareness of women as women of faith, who can bear witness to the unconditional love of God through acts of faith. They must realize that without love,

living together, diversity, peace and justice are not possible. We want to thank the women of Palestine for their testimony, and for the work they have done in the search for peace and love in such difficult times.

GHANA

The service was hosted by the Salvation Army, and churches across Ghana joined in the celebration. Before the event, the National Committee adapted, translated, printed, and distributed materials to all churches. Women were enthusiastic about learning the history and culture of Palestine. The songs were so spiritual, and the virtual choir did a great job of inspiring the celebration. We prayed for women and children affected by the war in Israel and Palestine, with the theme being particularly relevant as Ghana faces an election year, a time historically marked by periods of violence. The celebration was beautiful, and we remain grateful for the inspiration and continue to pray for peace.

IVORY COAST

MADAGASCAR

What made this event particularly exceptional, and touching, was its direct coincidence with the situation in Gaza. This year's focus on prayer for Palestine felt like a divine intervention, an inexplicable act of the Holy Spirit. This timing touched us deeply, illustrating how God used this event to address such a poignant and urgent situation.

This year's theme also resonated deeply with the political situation in Madagascar. The presidential elections

have generated a lot of discord, dividing politicians, populations and even Christian communities. We interpreted this as a call from the Spirit of God to regain unity and support one another in love, thus strengthening our faith and national solidarity.

This year, the history of Palestine was presented and we also organized Bible studies to deepen our knowledge.

To you, Christians of Palestine, although few in number in your country and constantly faced with the anxiety and torments of war, never forget that you are

a light that shines in the darkness, and your love for your country is admirable. Thank you for your perseverance, your firmness and your testimony. Despite the trials you experience, you keep faith in Jesus Christ, our Savior.

MALAWI

The theme for this program was relevant in a global sense, and to ensure women in our country fully understand and embrace it, we translated it into Chichewa, Tumbuka, and Chinkhonde. Our main and first event of the year

was held on the first Friday of March. Every year we invite the First Lady of the Republic of Malawi, and we are always honored to have her attend, as she did for this year's program along with other high-ranking officers from various sectors. This year, we had over 2,000 women join us in prayer on the opening day.

MAURITIUS

We held the 2024 WDP worship service as written by the women of WDP Palestine. Children sang "I Urge You," and we incorporated Palestine symbols into

our decorations to enhance the atmosphere. The service featured Aramaic prayers, virtual choirs, and olive branches exchanged during the sign of peace. A commemorative card with a prayer was also distributed during the service. Despite challenges that arose due to the conflict, the theme of mutual support resonated. Our gratitude goes to the WDP Palestine committee for their inspiring work, and to you our sisters in Christ, we say God has been your help in ages past, your hope for years to come. He'll be your shelter from the stormy blast. Your guard while troubles last. And your eternal home (Psalm 90).







NIGERIA

The theme was timely, based on the circumstances that surround Palestine, which also affect other nations of the world. We prayed for our Palestinian sisters, as well as offering up other intercessory prayers. It is our prayer that God will help us to bear one another in love and do more for the Lord. Adding color to this year's service was our celebration of the fifth anniversary of our WDP Committee of Nigeria at the national level.

REPUBLIC OF CONGO

WDP was celebrated in over 20 cities and villages. The liturgy was the highlight of the event. It was, however, challenging to engage many Congolese women and coordinate with various ecumenical churches in Congo-Brazzaville while honoring the Palestinian theme, especially since Palestine was at war. The theme deeply resonated with us, as we also share in experiences of political violence, making love an important message to spread. We used additional resources for related events, including the children's service led by the Salvation Army, which was thoroughly enjoyed by participants. We commend the Palestinian women for their strong, hopeful message of love amidst adversity.

SEYCHELLES

We celebrated WDP on Mahé and Praslin Islands of the Seychelles. This year's theme raised awareness of the need for prayer, and also the current situation in Gaza. We prayed for the wellbeing of Palestinian women and for peace in the region. The exchange of peace was done with scented leaves of medicinal plants, which were handed out before the service. Participants were asked to take the leaves to their homes, introducing peace. Photographs from Palestine were exhibited in the church porch, and PowerPoint slides were used prior to the service. The Bible Study was taken up by the Mothers Union Group, and conversation was enriching. Another topic of discussion was leadership by women worldwide, and we are working towards introducing more young women into the WDP movement through the celebration of the service.

SIERRA LEONE

Sierra Leone celebrated WDP at the historic St John's Maroon Church in Freetown. This year's theme, and the events in Palestine, served as a sobering reminder that the issues affecting women and children are universal, and it inspired awareness of the need for

further community engagement nation-wide with the aim of promoting peace. This year, we were unable to hold the service in the countryside due to political instability. In fact, the theme of 'bearing with one another in love' was a timely one in Sierra Leone due to electoral corruption and voter disenfranchisement, and as a Committee, we were responsible for networking with other organizations to promote peace through the media. As part of our outreach efforts, we visited the Freetown Cheshire Home for disabled children and the School for the Deaf and Dumb and donated provisions.

SOUTH AFRICA

WDP members eagerly anticipated this year's celebrations and were excited to organize the day of prayer that was, for many churches, their first since the Covid pandemic. Turnout was higher than expected, and service booklets were printed in 10 languages. This year, we also had our first combined national services with the South African Council of Churches in Soweto. Members have expressed a desire to expand the reach of WDP in their respective areas, and we have created branded golf shirts, scarves, bags and pins to increase visibility. The theme this year, which encourages tolerance, resonated with us, as our country





grapples with gender-based violence, high crime rates, political unrest and high levels of unemployment. The offerings collected will be directed toward providing shelter and food to those in need, youth development programs, and organizations tackling gender-based violence.

TANZANIA

What was particularly energizing and exciting about this year's WDP

was knowing that the liturgy was prepared by women from Palestine. This added a deeply touching and meaningful dimension to the event, as it highlighted global solidarity and shared faith among women from different parts of the world. We were deeply touched by the Palestinian womens' dedication to preparing the liturgy this year, and are inspired by their perseverance during this conflict. This year's theme resonated powerfully with many participants, emphasizing the importance of love and unity, fostering a spirit of solidarity in shared faith within the religious community and encouraging patience, humility and compassion within the nation at large. The death of former President Ali Hassan Mwinyi posed a

particular challenge to the scheduling of this year's service. The main service in Dar Es Salaam was broadcast on Upendo TV, and many people shared it through social media. We received many comments from women who watched the livestream. We ask that God grant strength, courage and guidance to our Palestinian sisters during these trying times. Their dedication to WDP inspires us all, and we are grateful for their partnership in spreading love and unity across the globe.

TOGO

Through WDP, the women of the Evangelical Presbyterian Church of Togo shared the concerns of the Palestinian women who prepared the liturgy and learned about the country's troubles. The celebration was also an opportunity to get to know Palestine's liturgical traditions, their songs and their way of reading the Bible. This year's theme sparked a conversation around the challenges of bearing with one another in love in an increasingly individualistic world where it can be difficult to reach out to others. Yet, we agreed that by giving a little love, we can create a climate of peace that the Palestinians currently need. This communion of prayer allowed us to share the joys and sorrows of our sisters far away, and affirmed our belief that "prayer and action play an essential role in the world and cannot be dissociated." The same faith unites us and leads us to act. So, like the Palestinian women, let us dare to move forward.

ZAMBIA

Given the ongoing conflict in Palestine, the theme felt particularly moving. While some initially had mixed feelings about celebrating the service due to the war, after clarification and guidance, the celebrations proceeded smoothly. The theme highlighted the importance of love, forgiveness, and unity in difficult times, making a significant impact on attendees. Our main service was broadcast live on YouTube and national television. We also utilized the children's materials in Sunday school programs, enriching their spiritual experience. We extend our heartfelt thanks to the women of Palestine for their courage in preparing such a timely and impactful theme, which inspired prayers for peace.

ZIMBABWE

We celebrated the program with a lunchhour service, while various churches hosted additional services throughout the country. A highlight of the event was a prayer session with Palestinian guest speaker, bringing more awareness to the situation. Despite facing challenges, the theme encouraged solidarity and empathy during difficult times. Around 800 services were held nationwide, attended by approximately 8,000 people, with the program translated into Shona and Ndebele. We are grateful to our Palestinian sisters for their powerful testimonies and theme, which reminded us of the importance of supporting each other in times of hardship.



Asia

HONG KONG

This year's global prayer penned by the women of Palestine held special significance in Hong Kong. Rev. Phyllis Wong delivered a sermon emphasizing the need to love and bear with one another in love, urging listeners to be witnesses of justice. She also reminded the congregation to remember refugees and foreign domestic workers in Hong Kong, encouraging them to speak up for the oppressed and live out God's Will. The women's stories and their resilience conjured an image of the leaves of an olive tree, commemorated by bookmarks inscribed with "Salaam al Massih" (Peace of Christ) to honor our commitment to walk with all women, especially those oppressed, subjected to violence, or discriminated against, and to strive for peace and justice.

INDIA

WDP in India this year was a transformative event. Educating members and church leaders about the nature of the conflict between Palestine and Israel presented an initial challenge, which was addressed through informative seminars. The WDP Committee worked to dispel myths commonly held among

the women surrounding the notion of the Holy War and Israelis as the "chosen race," maintaining that the war between Israel and Palestine, which involves the suffering of our fellow Christians, is not a holy one. We gave seminars and talks to educate our women and church leaders. It was both challenging and difficult,



but with wisdom from God, the help of experts, and the sharing of facts helped us to reach the goal. The annual theme, 'bear with one another in love,' created a feeling of solidarity among the women, as India is a country of many religions, ethnicities, creeds, classes, and operates under a caste system. This reminded us that no one is superior to another. We are indebted to our sisters in Palestine for creating a meaningful worship order. It was relevant, thought-provoking and blessed. We hope and pray that the war ends soon.

JAPAN

Before WDP this year, the significance of the chosen theme was unclear. However, as the situation in Palestine has unfolded, we have come to understand that these words are important now more than ever. The story of Shireen Abu Akleh, a Palestinian-American journalist who was gunned down by Israeli forces in May of 2022 while reporting on a Palestinian refugee camp in the West Bank, was shocking and stayed with us. We were reminded that this has been the same state of affairs in Palestine ever since the "Nakba", which translates to 'catastrophe' in Arabic, during the Arab-Israeli War of 1948. "Nakba" was a traumatic event during which hundreds of thousands of Palestinians were





violently dispossessed and displaced from their homeland, their society destroyed and their culture, identity and political and national rights suppressed in what some human rights scholars deem an apartheid that continues to this day. Article 9 of the Japanese Constitution, a world-class "Peace Constitution," renounces war, but a recent push to reinterpret and amend it suggests we are drifting away from pacifism towards a self-defensive military policy. WDP services this year were a cry to Christians around the world to take action and seek peace.

We were happy to have so many young women with us, who imbued the services with creativity. We learned that 'bearing' in Arabic means 'carrying,' and is also used to describe a pregnant woman. Women not only carry the physical burden of child bearing, but also shoulder heavy responsibilities in the midst of patriarchal societies. A reporter from

ALBANIA

We celebrated the World Day of Prayer in different churches around Albania, as well as in homes for the elderly. We did not know very much about the history of Palestine, and it was energizing to learn more about this. It was challenging when people why we were praying specifically for Palestine this year, and we had to explain that the materials were prepared before the most recent conflict started. The theme this year resonates with the situation in our country because we are very close to the conflict between Kosovo and Serbia. We spoke a lot about peace during our services, noting that we should bear with one another in love. Before the services, we did some crafts together. We are grateful to WDP Palestine for all they have done. Everything was excellent and we will keep them in our thoughts, hearts and prayers. We are grateful that Care for Albania, a Christian foundation, supports the WDP activities in our country. More than 50% of our population is atheist, a result of living for 50 years under a

dictatorship regime. For the last 30 years, we are free to believe, and we continue trying to change our system to a democracy, but we still have a high percentage of unemployment and corruption in government.

AUSTRIA

WDP Austria has been supporting the well-known Palestinian peace activist and author Sumaya Farhat Naser, because we appreciate her important work with pupils and young people in the field of de-escalation and peace as well as the empowerment of women. Through her books and project reports, we are informed about the difficult situation in Palestine, and we looked forward to sharing this with the Austrian public through our materials, public lectures and talks. Many women commented in the feedback form that people were thankful to get more information about the country and the situation of women. Many also mentioned that they remembered very well the WDP celebrations of 1994, and many groups liked this

year's songs very much! Also, we recommended the Bible Study by Ulrike Bechmann and Viola Raheb.

At the beginning of 2023, we were very much looking forward to the celebrations, not yet aware of how much worse the situation would become for Palestinian women. This time, the celebration was much more difficult and controversial than in 1994 due to the Oct 7, 2023 attack, a day that changed everything. We ended up in the crossfire, being accused of anti-Semitism because of the lituryg from WDP Palestine. This accusation came from an online article published in Germany, which was picked up by the Austrian public radio station and television. One reason for this accusation was a lack of understanding about WDP. Most of the journalists and many theologians criticized the liturgy without having even read it, just referring to the online article. We sought dialogue with the critics, and eventually found a solution which allowed us to celebrate the original version of the liturgy from our Palestinian sisters. By the end, we





received more support than criticism from both our WDP women as well as others in Austria.

The situation in Austria was definitely not easy this year, but we are grateful from the support from WDP Palestine, who of course are suffering the most. We appreciated WDP Palestine's gratitude, expressed in a letter, thanking Austria for sticking to the liturgy. This was a sign for us that we made the right decision in a challenging time.

GERMANY

World Day of Prayer was celebrated ecumenically in most communities throughout Germany, in solidarity with the women in Palestine. This was a very challenging year for WDP in Germany. We are painfully aware that Germany is the main reason for the founding of the state of Israel, which followed the expulsion and mass killing of Jews in Germany. This year's program also meant a special challenge for the Protestant churches in Germany, since many of these churches have declared a guilty plea, admitting their complicity in this history. They feel obliged to show unconditional solidarity to Israel, although what is meant by "Israel" is not always clearly defined. In addition, the evangelical currents in these churches absolutely prioritize the "Chosen People," which they justify biblically and theologically. With this background, positive statements about Palestine are quickly described as anti-Semitic, anti-Israel and anti-Iudaism.





The October 7, 2023 attack by Hamas was a great challenge for us in Germany, and led to attempts to use WDP as a political instrument. Absolute solidarity with Israel came to the fore, and demonstrators were criminally forbidden to use the slogan, "from the river to the sea." There was also a threat that churches in Germany would forbid and lock their doors to WDP services. Throughout all of this, we remained absolutely clear that the liturgy from WDP Palestine was not anti-Semitic. However, a renewed contextualization became necessary as we looked for a way to make the Palestinian voices heard.

We will truly remember this World Day of Prayer 2024. In all of the services, people attending celebrated that the WDP demonstrated a defiant solidarity with our Palestinian sisters. Many were moved by how WDP Palestine wove the olive tree into their prayer order, a wonderful symbol of their lives. This service did not only get under our skin, but also through our hearts, and we were deeply touched.

IRELAND

Given the distressing situation that continues in Palestine and Israel, this year's message and theme was prophetic. The chant that was composed especially for this service emphasized the theme and it was very easy for people to learn, being scriptural and singable. We had a significant increase in donations this year, and our local groups requested that we give most of the financial support to Palestinian families, women and children.

We did experience some tension this year as we prepared the service for our national broadcaster, RTE. The text had to be examined by their legal team in order to ensure fairness in reporting and avoid any litigation from any individual viewers or organizations. We were relieved that RTE decided to go ahead with the transmission of the service without changing any of the words of the text. We really wanted the authentic voices of the Palestinian women to be heard in their entirety. We did add some prayers specifically for Israel, and also encouraged local branches to use Archbishop Justin Welby's prayer during their service, praying for all the people of the Holy Land – Israeli, Palestinian, Jew, Christian and Muslim. We had a wonderful school choir from Co Meath leading us in song, and we learned later that over 38,000 people had tuned into the program, way above any number we had anticipated. We think many people were interested because of their outrage and sadness about the war in Gaza.

The liturgy, prepared by Palestinian women, presented a challenge due to Poland's complex history, including the scars of WWII, the Holocaust, decades of communism, and the current war in Ukraine. Recognizing these sensitivities,





the Polish Ecumenical Council and the WDP National Committee adapted the liturgy after extensive consultations. While most of the original content was used, we also included prayers for peace in Palestine, Israel, and Ukraine. Our focus was on uniting participants in prayer for global peace, guided by the biblical call to "Make every effort to keep the unity of the Spirit through the bond of peace" (Ephesians 4:3).

PORTUGAL

We had heartfelt celebrations, held in four locations on varying dates around early March. It was inspiring to witness women from different denominations set aside their differences to come

together with a shared purpose, singing and praying with enthusiasm. The celebration was also highlighted in a local magazine called "Portugal Evangélico" which was exciting. Our gratitude goes to the women of WDP Palestine, who demonstrated incredible dedication despite immense hardships. We continue to pray for peace in their homeland.

ROMANIA

This was a very special worship, and we have seen a growth in enthusiasm, numbers, unity and contributions. It was energizing to get to know about Palestine in a deeper way than what is presented in the media and news. We felt a deep reverence for the lives of Palestinian women, and we really enjoyed singing their songs. This year was a challenge because of the tension between Palestine and Israel. It wasn't easy to find the right words and to call the situation by its name. We were outraged that people live in areas surrounded by a high concrete wall, and have to worry every day that their access to their workplace might be denied. We were also outraged that Israelis continue to build settlements in Palestinian territory and then prohibit Palestinians from digging wells. We were devastated









that many boys often have no other plans for the future than to become martyrs. We were horrified about the destruction of houses, where children play in rubble with discarded weapons. We are shocked by the misery that exists in such a big contrast to the high-tech Israeli society. And, we were moved to tears that there are people on both sides who still believe in peace and togetherness.

The theme resonated with us in Romania, where we have lived in a culturally and linguistically diverse society for centuries. Our country is currently facing political elections, and it is very sad for us to see parties who do not understand this Bible verse. We see the great opportunity for the churches and WDP to act for a better understanding. We give big praise and thanks to WDP Palestine for this very moving service. The program was well structured, the songs were easy to sing, and the country background was of great importance. We wish our Palestinian sisters a peaceful life, full of respect and justice. They will stay in our prayers!

SPAIN

Overall, given that Palestine is in the news and in our daily prayers, there was a great reception of the WDP this year and much generosity with the offerings. Being able to meet with the Palestinian women by Zoom was a blessing and the virtual choirs were a nice touch. The good thing we got out of the pandemic is these technologies that bring us closer to each other across distances—locally, nationally and internationally.

We really enjoyed the "hands for peace" activity of the Bible study. The giving of the olive leaf at the beginning of the service was also very nice, as it transmitted peace and love. In Spain, we have

abundant olive trees, so it also helped us to feel close to the Palestinians. We loved the singing, and in Madrid we chose to listen to the Palestinians singing, helping us to feel them among us. In Barcelona, they loved ringing the bell to call people to worship and a parish choir sang several of the proposed songs.

The theme is a great challenge, because many people try to impose themselves on others and it is necessary to embrace fraternity and peace. The theme has given us an impulse for ecumenism, since it must be more difficult and at the same time more urgent to "tolerate one another in love" in Palestine. If they can do it, so can we. Moreover, it is important to establish bonds of fraternity in times of peace so that they reduce the possibility of conflicts. They are not



a luxury but a necessity. We admire the courage of the Palestinian women in the face of injustice and how they denounce it, based on the Gospels. We also found the question important: Tolerate to what extent? There are things that cannot be tolerated. Loving one's enemies does not mean letting them continue in their sins, but it entails working for their redemption.

SWEDEN

We were amazed that the Palestinian women wrote these material, as Palestine came into focus worldwide after October 7, 2023. It was a timely grace that in the midst of war, God provided this "umbrella of prayers" worldwide focusing on the situation in the Holy Land. The theme—to bear with each other in love is a challenging theme for all, but especially in their situation. In Sweden not everyone is familiar to the Palestinian women's struggle. Therefore, it was important to use their historical background. The three stories of women in the Worship Service underlined the tragic historical development and they were very touching.

Nevertheless, the Worship Service took place in at least 85 places and the offerings were larger than last year. In several places a meal was prepared with hummus, pita bread, olives and citrus fruits. Symbols like an olive tree, anemones or other red flowers and the Palestinian flag were at display. Several Swedish-Palestinian women participated

in the readings. Prayers for peace, justice and reconciliation was an important part of the service. The program including the music was highly appreciated and a way to express solidarity in prayers by many.

CHILE

Different denominations within the World Day of Prayer movement organized various services across cities. While the celebration was widespread, we faced challenges in keeping our people in prayer and maintaining their faith despite difficult circumstances. The message behind the theme was clear and current. We recognized that despite serving the same Lord, we struggle to maintain good relationships among brothers and sisters.

As we reflect on our experience, we would like to express our gratitude to the committee responsible for this year's program. We appreciate their fidelity to the Lord, their strength in the face of adversity, and their unconditional love for those who may not share the same beliefs or perspectives.

COSTA RICA

The services held throughout Costa Rica this year were led with a lot of commitment to a topic and a country experiencing a lot of pain. There was music and food from Palestine, and the people were impressed as they were unaware that the Palestinians had this history with years of suffering. WDP is very important because it makes us go beyond our local churches and beyond our country. It challenges us to new ways of living our faith and becoming one with the needs of others. It was a privilege to host the guest Consul of Palestine at a preperatory meeting as well as one

of the celebrations. She provided us with up-to-date information about her home country and confirmed/upheld the stories shared by the Palestinian women. She was both impressed and grateful for our movement, and we prayed with her and for her.

We struggled in knowing how to respond and break through the positions that idealize Israel as God's chosen people. It was difficult exploring this theme in the context of genocide. We also struggled with the theme in our own context, where growing intolerance distances us from God's love and the love that we must give each other.

In the city of Limon, an ecumenical worship service was held at the San Martin de Porras Catholic Church, where it was energizing to identify with the Palestinians. It was a challenge to learn the songs and identify with the stories of the women.





GUATEMALA

At services throughout Guatemala, women were encouraged to dress in traditional Palestinian clothing, and many shared food from the country around the table. The hymns were prepared, and combined with a song known in our region, Blessed Land. We were motivated to learn about the culture, social environment and lives of all who coexist in this country, the birthplace of Jesus. It was a challenge talking about Palestine in the context of the violence that made world news. There was a lot of resistance to talk about Palestine because of Zionism. It was also difficult to digest the theme of being tolerant in a context of war, as it is in Palestine. In Guatemala, talking about tolerance is difficult because of our history of internal armed conflict and the problems of discrimination, racism, classism and impoverishment. It had to be made very clear that being tolerant is not synonymous with injustice.

We used the Bible study, the Country Background and Photographs in addition to the Worship Service. We also used the Global Virtual Choir videos prepared by WDPIC, which was very special because we could see the faces of others celebrating around the world. We distributed postcards with contextual information. We are grateful for the courage of WDP Palestine in preparing this liturgy in the difficult context of war and genocide. It was good to understand the unofficial symbols of Palestine, such as watermelons and keys. We thank God because this

celebration helped turn our eyes to what is happening in Palestine.

We are grateful the Palestinian Christian women have never given up hope. They have reminded us to accept differences

and what makes each unique. Only then can we foster unity and love, cooperation, resilience and respect between the different ethnicities of the world.

Bearing Together in Love

hat a gift to walk alongside one another through this remarkable year. From virtual choirs uniting voices across continents, to young women gathering for pilgrimage, to regional conferences deepening relationships and understanding—we have witnessed countless ways that Christian women choose to journey with one another in love. Like the ancient olive trees of Palestine that survive and bear fruit through difficult conditions, our movement continues to demonstrate that bearing with one another is not passive acceptance but active commitment to unity and peace. The stories below offer glimpses of how God is working through our worldwide sisterhood. May they inspire us to continue walking side by side, our hearts growing wider with each step as we join together in the heartbeat of God's love.

PALESTINE 2024

Like the ancient olive trees that have witnessed centuries pass in the Holy Land, our Palestinian sisters offered wisdom born of deep roots and patient endurance. Through their worship service, centered on Ephesians 4:1–7, they shared three powerful stories of women choosing to "bear with one another in love"—stories of resilience passed down through generations, of truth-telling in the face of injustice, and of flourishing despite harsh circumstances. Like the olive tree's ability to survive and bear

fruit through difficult conditions, these stories showed us that bearing with one another in love is not passive acceptance but an active, costly commitment to unity and peace.


The service wove together potent symbols of Palestinian life—olive branches

indigenous Māori language, and the story of the first female Cook Islands doctor at the Pediatric Department of the Cook Islands—the service reveals how recognizing our divine worth transforms our relationships with ourselves and each other. The worship materials beautifully integrate the spiritual and cultural treasures of the Cook Islands, weaving together the profound "Kia orana" greeting (which carries wishes for flourishing life), the beloved Tiare Maori national flower, and sacred imeni tuki hymns. Participants are invited into a rich sensory experience of prayer and worship through ocean sounds, movement, shared blessings, and meaningful symbols of island life.

The program thoughtfully addresses contemporary challenges in the Cook Islands, from language preservation and healthcare accessibility to climate change impacts and youth empowerment, while remaining anchored in the central message that each person is "fearfully and wonderfully made" by God. The service culminates in a stirring call to prayerful action,

encouraging worshipers to embrace their identity as God's masterpiece and extend that same recognition to others. Through this lens of divine worth and purpose, WDP Cook Islands has crafted a program that both honors their distinctive cultural voice and speaks to our universal yearning to know ourselves as uniquely known, loved, and created by God. This culturally grounded approach brings the theme to vibrant life while connecting faith communities worldwide with the profound wisdom and spiritual insights of Cook Islander Christians.

NIGERIA 2026

The WDP Nigeria committee worked diligently through the first half of 2024 to develop their program centered on the theme "I Will Give You Rest: Come" from Matthew 11:28–30. Through powerful personal narratives and thoughtfully crafted worship elements, our Nigerian sisters address pressing challenges faced by their communities, including systemic oppression of widows, religious persecution, and the interconnected burdens of poverty and mental health.

The materials incorporate rich cultural elements such as vibrant African fabrics, traditional songs, and the joyful practice of dancing offerings, while weaving together universal themes of finding rest and renewal in God.

The completed worship materials were distributed to our global World Day of Prayer movement in fall 2024, giving committees ample time to translate and prepare for the March 2026 celebration. The service includes compelling stories like that of Beatrice, a young widow who found strength in faith and community; Jato, a mother whose daily act of sending her daughter to school becomes a testimony of courage amid religious tensions; and Blessing, whose account of persisting through economic hardship reflects the resilience of many Nigerians. Through these narratives and accompanying prayers, the Nigerian committee invites participants to both acknowledge life's heavy burdens and embrace Christ's promise of rest, while calling the worldwide movement to prayerful action in response to these challenges.

WDP CENTENNIAL 2027

Planning continues to build momentum for the WDP Centennial in 2027, marking 100 years of uninterrupted global ecumenical prayer led by Christian women. The WDPIC Executive Committee has been deepening their engagement with the theme "United in Prayer for Justice and Peace" through the development of an Intention Statement and selection of scripture passages that will guide the celebration. Conversations about the theme have been taking place with women's groups around the world, gathering insights and perspectives that will help shape this landmark observance. Additionally, work is underway to digitize the movement's rich archives, which contain 100 years of prayers, worship materials, music, artwork, and testimonies. This archival project will provide valuable resources as we develop materials that tell the story of our remarkable prayer movement.

In other exciting Centennial news, following a thorough application process from countries interested in hosting the 2027 WDPIC International Meeting, Ghana has been selected as the host country for this historic gathering. The selection carries special resonance as our current WDPIC Chairperson, Joyce Larko Steiner, PhD, made history in 2022 as the first African Chairperson in our movement's century-long journey. Dr. Steiner has provided powerful leadership, particularly with a focus on engaging and supporting young women in the movement. WDPIC is now working closely with WDP Ghana to finalize the location and dates for this significant meeting, which will bring women from around the world to the African continent for our centennial celebration. More details about the International Meeting and other Centennial celebrations will be shared as plans continue to develop.

COSTA RICA 2028

WDP Costa Rica hosted a Strengthening National Committee (SNC) workshop from November 14–16, 2024, at the Casa Conde Apartamentos in San Jose. This workshop was organized under the leadership of Rebeca Cascante, previously one of the WDPIC Latin America Regional Representatives. The workshop focused on exploring the theme "Leading the Way in Grace,"

drawing inspiration from multiple scripture passages including Joel 2:28, Isaiah 11:1-6, Jeremiah 1:4-8, and Luke 10:21-24. With a special emphasis on valuing young women's leadership and wellbeing, along with intergenerational sharing, the workshop aimed to strengthen the WDP Costa Rica Committee and establish expectations for the writing process. Participants worked on creating an Intention Statement and began planning for the Writer Workshop scheduled for Spring 2025. Through collaborative study of WDP Guiding Principles and deep engagement with the theme, the workshop laid a foundation for the development of the 2028 worship materials.

VIRTUAL GLOBAL CHOIR

WDPIC launched its first Virtual Global Choir initiative in 2024 as part of the preparations for the WDP Palestine celebration. Drawing together voices from across the movement's global community, the project produced virtual choral renditions of four songs from the WDP Palestine worship service, including the traditional Yarabba ssalami (God of

Peace), Wa atlubu (I Urge You), Naseeru binur elkalima (Your Word Lights the Path), and the Aramaic Lord's Prayer. The recordings featured soloists and choristers from over 15 countries singing in Arabic, English, Spanish and French, bringing together women, men, and children's voices in a powerful demonstration of WDP's worldwide reach.

The initiative was made possible through the generous sponsorship of WDP Committees and individual donors across several regions, including WDP Europe, WDP Malaysia, WDP United States, and Jeanie & Dennis Reimer. Produced under the technical direction of SueAnn Shiah and Pablo García, these virtual choral pieces, featuring artwork by Palestinian-German artist Halima Aziz, have been shared widely through

WDP's digital platforms, creating new opportunities for committees to incorporate multilingual music into their local celebrations.

YOUNG WOMEN'S PILGRIMAGE

Although the Young Women's
Pilgrimage to the Holy Land had to be
postponed, the selected young women
have maintained strong connections
through an active WhatsApp group,
keeping their sense of community alive.
The group demonstrated their continued
commitment by collaborating to create
a video recording of the WDP Palestine
worship service, which was shared on
YouTube. While awaiting the opportunity
to reschedule the Holy Land pilgrimage,
they remain united in prayer with their

sisters from WDP Palestine for a just peace in the region.

In the meantime, WDPIC has organized another Young Women's Pilgrimage to the Cook Islands, scheduled for January 19–26, 2025. Priority was given to members of the original Holy Land pilgrimage group, and the final cohort includes young women (ages 21–35) from Botswana, Germany, Ghana, Guyana, Honduras, Lebanon, Philippines, Tonga, and the USA. The group began their spiritual preparation through a series of Zoom meetings in fall 2024. Following the pilgrimage, WDP committees are encouraged to reach out to these young women to hear about their experiences and insights, ensuring that the impact of the pilgrimage extends throughout the broader WDP movement.

YOUNG WOMEN'S PILGRIMAGE

WDP AFRICA REGIONAL CONFERENCE

The second triennial WDP Africa
Regional Conference took place in
Lusaka, Zambia from Sept 22–27, 2024,
organized by WDP Africa Regional
Representatives Queen Bridget Chisha
(Zambia) and Rosalie Akoue ep Adze
(Gabon) in collaboration with WDP
Zambia. Under the theme Understanding
the Life in God's Service, based on Romans
12:1–2, the conference featured sessions
on governance, women's roles in church
and society, and climate justice. WDPIC
Chairperson Joyce Larko Steiner and

Executive Director Katie Reimer led sessions on WDP's history, Guiding Principles and new WDPIC initiatives. The conference included breakout sessions conducted in three language groups (Anglophone, Francophone, and Lusophone), cultural exchanges with traditional instruments from each country, and a special Thursdays in Black observance focusing on gender-based violence. Through shared meals, morning devotions, and evening fellowship, relationships among WDP leaders throughout Africa were strengthened and deepened, fostering

a stronger network of support and collaboration across the continent. The gathering concluded with a cultural night and gift exchange celebrating the rich diversity of the African region.

ECUMENICAL RELATIONSHIPS

WDPIC continues to strengthen its ties with fellow global women's ecumenical movements, particularly through its connections with the Asian Church Women's Conference (ACWC) and the International Committee Fellowship of the Least Coin (ICFLC). WDPIC participated in the 17th Quadrennial General Assembly of ACWC from November 5–8, 2023, held at the Presbyterian Bible College in Hsinchu, Taiwan. The assembly, themed Women Caring for God's





Earth and grounded in Romans 8:20–23, brought together women leaders from across Asia who shared reports of their WDP activities among other initiatives. Following the assembly, WDPIC participated in the annual ICFLC board meeting as one of eleven ecumenical partners. This partnership is particularly meaningful as both WDPIC and ICFLC are global ecumenical prayer movements led by women.

A new relationship is growing between WDPIC and the World Student Christian Federation (WSCF)-US. WDP USA Chair Neethi Prasad and WDPIC Executive Director Katie Reimer were invited to lead a service using the WDP Palestine materials at WSCF's Student Leadership Team meeting in New York City on April 12, 2024. This connection continued to grow through Neethi and Katie's invitation to participate and lead a session on WDP in WSCF-US's October 2024 conference, Embodied Faith: Christian Students Organizing for a New World, in Washington, D.C. The conference, based on 1 Corinthians 12:12-27, focused on equipping students and young adults with tools for social change while remaining grounded in prophetic



Biblical traditions. Through workshops, creative expression, and community building, participants explored their roles in social movements as individuals and as a collective body following Jesus' revolutionary way.

During the 68th session of the **United Nations Commission on the Status of Women (CSW)** (March 11–22, 2024),
WDPIC was invited to provide leadership for several worship services at the
Church Center for the United Nations.
The WDPIC Executive Advisory Group
(EAG), including Chairperson Joyce Larko

Steiner, Treasurer Deanne Newland,
Europe Regional Representative Edith
Toth, and Executive Director Katie
Reimer, collaborated on these worship services with Rev. Nicqi Ashwood,
Programme Executive for Just
Community of Women and Men at the
World Council of Churches, and Dionne
Boissiere, the first woman of African
descent to serve as chaplain at the
Church Center for the United Nations.
These services provided meaningful
opportunities for spiritual reflection
during this significant gathering focused
on women's rights and empowerment.

Our Collective Journey

GLOBAL CONVERSATION

On December 2, 2023, the World Day of Prayer International Committee (WDPIC) Executive Committee hosted a Global Conversation with WDP Palestine, bringing together regional representatives from around the world. A profound moment emerged when Shireen Awwad Hilal, Director of Bethlehem Bible College Community & Development Outreach, shared a powerful prayer for Gaza written by students and faculty. The virtual gathering highlighted the challenges and hopes of WDP Palestine as they prepared the 2024 worship materials, embodying our commitment to global sisterhood and mutual understanding during challenging times. Rev. Sally Azar, the first female Palestinian

pastor in the Holy Land, also shared reflections on their journey of preparing the worship materials, underscoring the resilience and spiritual depth of the Palestinian committee.


EXECUTIVE ADVISORY GROUP IN NYC

The WDPIC Executive Advisory Group (EAG) convened for an intensive in-person meeting from March 8–12, 2024, in New York City, marking a significant moment of reflection and strategic planning. This gathering brought together key leaders to engage in deep visioning for the World Day of Prayer movement, carefully examining our collective journey and charting a path forward. The group conducted a

comprehensive review of our current landscape, identifying critical areas for growth, strengthening, and future focus. Through intentional dialogue and collaborative discernment, the EAG began mapping out strategic priorities that will guide the movement in the years to come.

ANNUAL CONTRIBUTIONS

During the 2022 International Meeting, voting delegates from every committee affirmed a recommendation from the Administrative Working Group, collectively agreeing on a commitment for all World Day of Prayer National Committees to contribute at least 5% of their annual offering to the WDPIC by January 31 of the following year. the past year, WDPIC Treasurer Deanne Newland, working closely with Regional Representatives, has been instrumental in implementing this resolution. WDP NIGERIA 2026 MATERIALS

The WDPIC Executive Committee (EC) continued its work of supporting Writer Committees through a collaborative editing process. This year, the EC worked with WDP Nigeria as they developed the materials for the 2026 World Day of Prayer program. With careful attention and pastoral sensitivity, the EC reviewed the submitted materials, providing constructive feedback, theological insights, and words of encouragement.

This process reflects our commitment to ensuring that each year's worship materials are thoughtful, culturally rich, and spiritually profound, while supporting the Writer Committee

in their journey.

GLOBAL PRAYERS

Throughout the year, the Executive Committee responded to global challenges and moments of significance through heartfelt prayers of solidarity, lament, and thanksgiving. We lifted up prayers for those affected by devastating earthquakes in Turkey, Vanuatu, and Taiwan; for communities in Nigeria experiencing political unrest; for regions

impacted by hurricanes in the United States and Caribbean; in solidarity with Lebanon during times of conflict; and in grateful remembrance of theologian Gustavo Gutierrez. These prayers embodied our commitment to bearing one another's burdens, standing in spiritual communion with our sisters and brothers around the world during moments of profound challenge and hope.



Sumud: Bearing One Another's Truths

"Listening and speaking. Prayer is rooted in listening to God and to one another. In the World Day of Prayer, we listen to the Word of God and to voices of women sharing their hopes and fears, their joys and sorrows, their opportunities and needs."—WDP GUIDING PRINCIPLE #2

Our second Guiding Principle teaches us that prayer is about listening and speaking—to God and to one another. We are called to hear the voices of women across the world, to listen deeply to their hopes and fears, their joys and sorrows, their opportunities and needs. As Nelle Morton beautifully articulated, we are challenged to "hear one another into speaking"—creating a space where women find the courage to share their deepest truths.

This year has certainly not been easy. We have faced trials that tested the very fabric of our sisterhood—global tensions, personal struggles, and moments that threatened to pull us apart. Yet, by God's grace, we found a way through. We stayed in the struggle, kept talking to each other, kept walking together.

One of the most powerful ideas I have learned from Palestinians is the concept of *sumud*—steadfast perseverance.

Sumud is more than just endurance; it is a way of being that refuses to accept injustice while remaining rooted in love.

It is a profound spiritual practice that keeps our hearts open even in the face of difficulty.

I see sumud manifested in our collective journey. I see it in the way WDP leaders maintain connections across borders and time zones, patiently building relationships that strengthen our worldwide sisterhood. Our young women demonstrated this spirit beautifully. Even when their planned pilgrimage was postponed, they maintained their bonds and found creative ways to share the Palestine worship materials. Our Virtual Global Choir became a testament to our resilience—people from different continents patiently learning new songs and languages to create something beautiful together. Throughout our movement, we continue bringing women together across denominations in unified prayer.

The spirit of *sumud* reminds us that bearing with one another in love is both a gift and a commitment—one that transforms us as we practice it. When we choose to stay steadfast in


our relationships, when we persevere in listening to each other's stories, when we maintain hope for justice while refusing to give in to despair, we participate in God's vision for our world.

I am deeply grateful to our Palestinian sisters for sharing this wisdom with us, and to all the women in our movement who demonstrate steadfast perseverance day after day. May we continue to bear with one another in love, trusting that our patient, persistent way of being will transform the very landscape of our world—breaking down walls of division, healing ancient wounds, and illuminating pathways to a just peace that embraces all.

WDP at a Glance

The World Day of Prayer is a global ecumenical movement led by Christian women who welcome all to join in prayer and action for peace and justice. The common day of observance is the first Friday of March, but WDP activities are held all year long.

Every year this journal aims to summarize the activities of this worldwide, ecumenical movement. It helps us all to see and understand how our prayer movement is being celebrated internationally. The 2024 Journal is based on 83 annual reports received out of the 146 countries that received the WDP worship service materials.



How will WDP offering make a difference in Palestine and around the world?

The World Day of Prayer Guiding
Principles acknowledge that all people have something to give and to receive. Local groups receive the materials from the Writer Committee and respond with giving. Each National Committee decides how to use offerings collected each year. Through this WDP offering, financial resources are shared with women and children around the world. The exchange of stories and gifts is one way that our motto of "Informed prayer, Prayerful action" is lived out.

WDP Palestine has indicated a few projects and organizations to support as a sign of our global solidarity. The projects and organizations aim



to protect and promote women's human rights, to build towards a society of equality between women and men, to support children's hospitals and centers for those living with disabilities and the elderly.

WDP 1927-2031 THEME TIMELINE

Our latest WDP poster showcases 104 years of World Day of Prayer worship services. The timeline poster lists the writers who have lent their voices to the movement, and the themes that motivated their prayers since

1927. Our movement of "Informed Prayer, Prayerful Action" has grown and expanded over the years and, in 2027, our movement will have reached the incredible milestone of 100 years of uninterrupted prayer!

WDP COOK ISLANDS

"I Made You Wonderful" March 7, 2025



ur sisters from WDP Cook Islands have spent the last few years deepening into the theme, "I Made You Wonderful," based on Psalm 139:1–18. Their program invites us into the knowledge that each one of us was made with care and love by God. When we have the capacity to receive this profound truth, everything in our life changes and we begin to radiate and shine from within.

Our first Guiding Principle in the World Day of Prayer articulates that our starting point is Christian women. This has been an essential conviction of our movement over the last century. Too often, women and girls have been silenced and oppressed, making this upcoming theme from WDP Cook Islands particularly relevant. The message that we as women and girls are "fearfully and wonderfully" made in the image of God reinforces our movement's support of women "express[ing] their faith and speak[ing] about their lives in prayer and worship before God and in community."

The Worship Service invites us to notice aspects of our divinely created bodies that

we often take for granted. Following this grounding opening liturgy, we are then invited to hear the scripture from Psalms 139:1–18, woven together with stories of three women from the Cook Islands. We come to understand that God knows us, is always with us, and made us unique and special.

Our sisters from Cook Islands have invited us to offer prayers of adoration and thanksgiving to our Creator, followed by prayers of confession and longing. The prayers of intercession guide us to ask God for wisdom, courage and healing, so that all people would be treated as fearfully and wonderfully made.

What happens when we realize that God is with us and for us? How would we live differently if we really believed that we are God's masterpiece? What we think impacts how we act and changing the way we think changes how we act.

Praise God for the dedication and love of our sisters in Cook Islands as they prepared these materials. May they bless us all.

WDP NIGERIA

"I Will Give You Rest: Come"
March 6, 2026

The WDP program from Nigeria bring us a powerful invitation drawn from Matthew 11:28–30. At a time when people worldwide are carrying heavy burdens, our Nigerian sisters offer profound insights into finding rest in God.

Through their exploration of different kinds of burdens—shame, systemic oppression, religious persecution, poverty and despair —the writers help us understand both the weight of human suffering and the depths of divine rest. Their work shows us that true rest isn't just about physical relief, but about transformation through God's grace and community support.

You'll find this theme beautifully expressed across all program components. The Worship Service features a playlet about Nigerian women and their experiences reveal how God provides rest through community support, faith, and hope. The Bible

Study explores divine rest from creation to Jesus' time, examining wisdom traditions and Jesus' transformation of rest from rigid rules to liberating mercy.

Original music was composed for the program includes a moving theme song by Chisom R. Chukwumerije, written especially for this World Day of Prayer service. The song invites those who are weary and oppressed to find comfort and rest in God.

The artistic work of Gift Amarachi Ottah beautifully captures the theme through her depiction of burdens carried by women from diverse backgrounds.

The Nigerian committee has woven together their cultural wisdom with the universal need for rest. Through symbols like the calabash bowl, which represents



both daily sustenance and divine provision, they remind us how God meets us in our weariness.

As we prepare for WDP 2026, may we learn to embody Jesus' invitation: 'Come to me, all you who are weary.' Together, let us become channels of God's rest in our troubled world.
